Greenwich-Stamford Summer Bird Count Results

The Basics: June 13 & 14, 141 species, 22,627 individual birds, plus one count period species. Forty-nine observers in 29 Parties observed for 307.5 party hours. Good weather produced high numbers for many species. Since its 1976 founding, 228 count period species have been recorded, with **Red Knot** a new count species this year.
